


Korowa Anglican Girls' School is one of Victoria's top independent schools and has been at the forefront of girls' education since 1890.

Korowa is renowned for our long history of academic excellence. Our NAPLAN and VCE scores consistently place us in the top tier of schools across the state. Our students' achievements span Sport, Music, Art, Science, Literature and many more.

At Korowa, every staff member knows every student and they encourage them to pursue their own unique interests, talents and ambitions - wherever they may lie. We offer small class sizes so that every student can receive the support they need and build positive relationships with their teachers.

Our Early Learning Centre welcomes 3 & 4 year old girls and boys, then from Prep - Year 12 we offer a specialised all-girls environment. We cater for a range of learning styles and offer a broad curriculum to ensure that the individual needs of every student are met. Teaching is student-centred, drawing on the natural curiosity and interests of students to engage them in the learning process.

2015 was a year of celebration and a chance to reflect on 125 years of tradition, history and success that has made Korowa the great school that it is today. Korowa's commitment to excellence in learning for both students and staff has meant that we have had much to celebrate across sport, art, music and academic achievement. In 2015, we were listed in the top 50 schools in Victoria based on our past NAPLAN results. However, the achievements that are most significant over the course of time are those which demonstrate our community living out our School motto in the pursuit of personal best.

Korowa's history of success is characterised through the words 'Palma Non Sine Pulvere' – a term in use since 1908. This is a quote from Horace, the Roman poet, which directly translates into 'no palms without dust'. The school council has had a very busy year. Guiding the completion of major building projects, helping to improve our risk and governance frameworks, monitoring the strategic plan, managing the leadership transition – these have stretched many on the council, and I thank all members for their donation of time and talents, and their passionate enthusiasm

Our retiring Directors are James Wright, Barbara Caddaye, Helen McDonald and Robert Turnbull. Between them they have given over 37 years of voluntary service to the School – what an amazing group of people!

With the support of bountiful gifts from two special donors we were able to complete the building of the John Wilson Memorial Chapel, which now forms the spiritual heart of our School. I wish to thank, sincerely, Sandra Ivory and the Cripps Foundation for their generosity in funding the capital cost of the chapel.

The school also undertook a very extensive and complex refurbishment of the former Roberts Wing. Ranfurlie House is now a bright, welcoming and highly functional building housing much of the school administration, enrolment services, human resources, marketing and the Principal's office. During the year, the school also completed the remodelling of the former administration centre into the new, dedicated Student Services centre.

In 2016, work will commence to develop a new Master Plan for the School. This will help direct all of our major capital works over the next 10 or more years. The plan will include input from all sectors of the Korowa community, will involve experienced consultants and will be influenced by our updated strategic plan. It will incorporate consideration of new and exciting educational imperatives together with state-of-the-art architectural responses to these changes.

There will always be a demand for the highest quality educational experience for girls of all ages. Korowa provides this benefit for girls from the very beginning of their learning, through to their advancement to tertiary levels. To continue to excel Korowa needs to expand its offerings in line with the latest educational trends and align with exciting and different future work options. This requires the physical renewal of the campus, our learning spaces, our co-curricular facilities and our physical health and sports facilities.

A diverse and inclusive student population

At Korowa we celebrate every child as an individual. We cherish our students' unique attributes and welcome the diverse backgrounds and experiences they bring to our School.

- Our students speak more than 23 languages at home. They were born in more than 20 countries. Their parents have come from even more countries!
- Our students travel from more than 57 postcodes across Melbourne to come to Korowa each day.
- More than 10% of our students are children and/or grandchildren of Korowa alumni.

Student Attendance

Around 610 students attend Korowa each day. Attendance is recorded and managed by teachers in the Synergetic attendance management system.

In the Junior School, teachers record Junior School student attendance at the beginning of the day and after lunch. If a student is absent from School and the School has not been informed of the reason for the absence, the student's parents/guardians are contacted by 10am.

In the Middle and Senior Schools, teachers record student attendance each lesson, including Advisory Time, which takes place at the beginning of the day. If a student is marked absent for Advisory Time and Period 1 and the School has not been informed of the reason for the student being absent then a text message is sent to the parents/guardians at mid-morning. Absences that occur after this time are managed on a case by case basis.

All late arrivals and early leavers sign in or out at Junior School Reception (Junior School) or Student Services (Middle and Senior School). Students who are leaving early must present a written note from a parent/guardian to the Junior School Reception/Student Services, or be in the presence of a parent/guardian when signing out of the School. Students who are unwell, are assessed by the School's Health Carer, who determines whether the student should be collected by a parent/guardian.

Students who demonstrate persistent absence and/or lateness are supported by a relevant staff member, according to principles outlined in the Korowa Student Behavior Management Policy.

Student Satisfaction

Students across the school were offered both informal and formal opportunities to share their voice and impressions of their Korowa experience. In particular, Year 9 and 10 students engaged in forum discussions, which focused on the transition into the Senior School and the ways in which this important phase of learning can be enhanced. As a result, Year 9 2016 students will experience increased experiential learning opportunities throughout the course of the year, as well as a diversified Term 4 experience. Similarly, student voice has influenced the curriculum offerings at the Year 9 and 10 level and, after a period of review, we are poised to implement the renewed Year 9 and 10 elective program in 2016.

In addition, students from across Years 7 – 10 participated in a survey designed to provide students with the opportunity to comment on their experience of teacher practices in a range of subject areas. The girls' thoughtful responses have informed our approach to professional learning in 2016.

Parent Satisfaction

High parent satisfaction occurs when parents feel their child is safe; where parents are welcome, engaged and supported; and where teachers provide help and support for all students, catering for all abilities. They also seek a school where their children are provided with good levels of resources, including ICT, and appropriate preparation for the transition to the next school year.

In 2015, our parent forums focused on the key question of "How might Korowa encourage parents to be involved with the School in a variety of ways?" and in response to the detailed discussions held in the Junior, Middle and Senior Schools, Korowa is implementing a 2016 stewardship strategy, designed to better engage and meet the needs of parents across the levels. Examples of this are our Pop-Up Parenting Seminars and the Introduction of additional community events, including the Junior School Mothers' Day Celebration, International Women's Day celebrations, and Senior School Father/Daughter breakfasts.






2015 ATAR Results




First Round Offers Based on Institution



First Round Offers by Field of Education*






